SNAP is the Supporting Newcomer Access Project, providing peer-based sexual health education for newcomer youth



CHOOSE DESTINATION 

- Newcomer youth face a lot of barriers to good health including poverty, discrimination and unemployment.¹
- Youth are the second largest group of newcomers to Canada, and the newcomer youth population in Toronto is growing every day²
- Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual/Transgender/Queer (LGBTQ) newcomer youth can experience discrimination and racism in their personal relationships, LGBTQ community in Canada, their family and cultural community, and when they access healthcare³

- 19% of newcomer youth in Toronto have received no formal sexual education.⁴



That's approximately one out of five youth

- Newcomer youth are less likely to access sexual health services than Second-Generation and Canadian-born youth
- In 2015, SNAP did 20 workshops and reached over 350 newcomer youth
